



Survey of Businesses' Inflation Expectations

Inflation Expectations Survey



The Statistical Institute of Jamaica (STATIN) undertakes surveys of businesses on behalf of the Bank of Jamaica to ascertain the expectations of these economic agents about variables which are likely to have an impact on inflation in the near-term. In this regard, the survey captures the perception of Chief Executive Officers, Managing Directors and Financial Controllers about the future movement of prices, current and future business conditions and the expected rate of increase in wages/salaries. These responses assist the Central Bank in charting future policy decisions. The

most recent survey was conducted between 25 March 2019 and 6 May 2019 and had 305 respondents. Below are highlights from that survey.

If you expect inflation, what do you expect the rate of inflation to be for the current calendar year and over the next 12 months?”





Figure 2: Expected Annual Inflation

Overview

- The April 2019 survey indicated an expected inflation of 4.5 per cent for calendar year (CY) 2019, which was higher than the March 2019 survey outturn of 4.2 per cent. The expected inflation 12 months ahead increased to 4.7 per cent relative to the previous survey outturn of 4.5 per cent.
- The perception of inflation control decreased marginally in the April 2019 survey relative to the March 2019 survey.
- Respondents anticipate that the currency will appreciate over all three surveyed time horizons (3-month, 6-month, and 12-month horizons).
- The majority of respondents continued to believe that the Bank’s Policy rate will remain the same over the next three months.
- The Present Business Conditions and Future Business Conditions both reflected a lower level of optimism relative to the previous survey.


Inflation Expectations

In the April 2019 survey, respondents’ expectation for inflation for (CY) 2019 was **4.5 per cent**. This expectation was above the annual point-to-point inflation of **3.9 per cent** for April 2019 (see **Figure 1**). Respondents’ expectation of inflation 12 months ahead also increased to **4.7 per cent**, from the previous survey’s estimate of **4.5 per cent** (see **Figure 2**).

*December 2005 = 100



Perception of Inflation Control

Businesses' perception of the authorities' control of inflation decreased marginally in the April 2019 survey (see **Figure 3**). This was largely due to a decline in the proportion of respondents who were "neither satisfied nor dissatisfied," along with an increase in the proportion of respondents who were "dissatisfied" with how inflation was being controlled.

Exchange Rate Expectations

Similar to the previous survey, respondents anticipate appreciation over all three time horizons. However, a slower pace of appreciation was expected. In the April 2019 survey, the exchange rate was anticipated to appreciate by **1.2 per cent**, **0.7 per cent**, and **0.7 per cent** for the 3-month, 6-month, and 12-month horizons, respectively. This compares with the respective expected appreciation of **2.6 per cent**, **2.1 per cent**, and **1.1 per cent** that were recorded in the March 2019 survey (see **Table 1**).

Interest Rate Expectations: 90-day T-bill

Survey respondents expected the 90-day Treasury bill rate, three months hence, to be **2.6 per cent**. This expected rate is higher than the actual April 2019 outcome of **2.16 per cent** (see **Figure 4**). Financial sector respondents expected the 90-day Treasury bill rate, three months hence, to be **2.6 per cent**.



Figure 5: Present Business Conditions


In general, do you think business conditions are better or worse than they were a year ago in Jamaica?

Interest Rate Expectations: Policy Rate

In the April 2019 survey, the majority of respondents expected that the Bank’s policy rate would remain the same over the next three months. This proportion increased relative to the previous survey.

With regard to the financial sector, the majority of respondents expected that the Bank’s policy rate would be unchanged. Furthermore, responses from the financial sector revealed that **20.8 per cent** of respondents expected the rate to be marginally higher, lower than the proportion of **24.0 per cent** in the March 2019 survey.

Perception of Present and Future Business Conditions

In the April 2019 survey, the Present Business Conditions Index decreased marginally to **127.9** relative to **128.9** recorded in the previous survey. The Future Business Conditions Index also decreased to **145.0** relative to **153.5** in the previous survey (see **Figures 5 and 6**).

The decline in the Present Business Conditions Index reflected a decrease in the number of respondents of the view that conditions are “better.” The outturn for the Future Business Conditions Index mainly reflected a decrease in the proportion of respondents who believe that conditions will be “better.”

Expected Increase in Operating Expenses

Respondents indicated that they expected the largest increase in production costs over the next 12 months to emanate from stock replacement, utilities, and fuel/transport. The cost of raw materials is anticipated to be the least likely to increase (see **Table 3**).
